


WE PROCLAIM THE WORD



Glory to you, O Lord.

The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while." For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. And also with you.



And also with you. We lift them to the Lord.


It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Sharing the Meal


Please be seated


