MAUNDY THURSDAY LITURGY

The word "Maundy" comes from the Latin for "commandment". On this night, we remember how Jesus, after washing his disciples' feet, said, "I am giving you a new command. You must love each other, just as I have loved you. If you love each other, everyone will know that you are my disciples." This night we open ourselves to receive Jesus' love and recommit ourselves to letting that same love flow through us to others.

Tonight we will read the story of Jesus washing the feet of his disciples. As people would have walked dusty streets barefoot, their feet would have been dirty, blistered, and battered. Washing the disciples' feet is Jesus' way of telling his followers that, just as he will suffer for refusing to go along with the ways of the Empire, they can expect the same thing to happen to them when they resist the Empire.

Tonight you will have an opportunity to receive the gift of foot- and hand-washing. The directions for this are on page 9 of your bulletin.

Glory to you, O Lord.

After Jesus had washed his disciples' feet and had put his outer garment back on, he sat down again. Then he said:

"Do you understand what I have done? You call me your teacher and Sovereign, and you should, because that is who I am. And if your Sovereign and teacher has washed your feet, you should do the same for each other. I have set the example, and you should do for each other exactly what I have done for you. I tell you for certain that servants are not greater than the householder, and messengers are not greater than the one who sent them. You know these things, and God will bless you, if you do them.

Great Thanksgiving

Side by side, we follow him.

On the night in which he was betrayed, Jesus took bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "This is my body, broken for you. Do this to remember me." After supper, he took the cup and gave it to them, saying, "This cup is the new covenant sealed in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this to remember me."

Holy Spirit, breathe on us, and on these gifts of bread and wine, that sharing in the blessed, broken, risen life of Jesus, we may share his continual life and presence. Make of us one body, so we might live at home in your love until no one is homeless. With confidence, we pray in your name:

Sharing the Meal

Whoever you are, from wherever you come, whatever you believe, you are welcome and invited to receive. Come! For all things are now ready.

Please be seated

You may come forward to receive the elements, remain seated and use the pre-filled communion cups available at the door, or let an usher know you'd like to be served in your seat. Wine is in the outer rings of the tray, grape-apple juice in the inner ring. Gluten-free wafers are available on request, ask Pastor.

Foot- and Hand-Washing

We will wash feet and hands in the back of the sanctuary. After you have received communion, come to the back of the sanctuary and take a seat. (If you choose not to receive communion, you can come directly back at any time.) When a washing station is open, if you wish to have your feet washed, leave your shoes and socks under the chair and go to the station. Once you are seated, one foot will be washed (a simple pouring of water over the foot) and then dried. This is repeated for the second foot. Then return to your chair, put on your shoes and socks, and return to your pew. If you wish to have your hands washed, simply go to an open station and be seated. Water will be poured over your hands, and then they will be dried.



Closing Words

This is the last meal Jesus and his disciples shared together before he gave his all and emptied himself – before the powers-that-be decided that his compassion and courage were too much of a threat. The ultimate fate of his message and mission would be in the hands of the likes of us – deniers, doubters, betrayers all – saints and sinners and prodigal children. Tonight, fed and washed, may his compassion and courage come alive in us, as we invite the Holy Spirit to live and work in us, who, in spite of all the ways we fall short, still are fed and washed, still are named God's beloved.

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Stripping of the Altar

The altar represents Christ, and the solemn removal of all that is on it forces us to confront his betrayal, abandonment, arrest, and, tomorrow, his execution. While the altar is stripped, Psalm 22 is read. On the cross, as he feels so abandoned and alone, Jesus cries out using words from this psalm.

*My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?
Why are you so far from me,
from my desperate cries for help?
I call you by day, O my God,
but you do not answer me;
by night, but I find no rest.*

*Yet you are the Holy One,
praised by the people and enthroned in the sanctuary.
In you our ancestors put their trust.
They trusted, and you set them free;
they cried and were delivered;
they trusted you, and were not disappointed.*

*But I am a worm, hardly human,
despised by all, mocked by the crowd.
All who see me jeer at me. They sneer at me, shaking their heads:
“You relied on God; let God help you!
If God loves you, let God save you!”*

*Yet it was you who drew me from the womb
and soothed me at my mother’s breast.
I have belonged to you from my birth;
from my mother’s womb you have been my God.
I will tell out your name to my people;
I will praise you where they are assembled.

The Entrance of the Crown of Thorns

As part of their effort to humiliate and degrade him, the Roman soldiers created a crown from a thorn bush and put it on Jesus' head as they sarcastically knelt before him as "King of the Jews". We place a crown of thorns on the altar to remind us of this story. We depart in silence, painfully aware of the ways so much of creation suffers to support our lifestyles, and keep us from having to confront our culture's addiction to violence and fear.
