If you were in worship yesterday, you saw these words on the bulletin cover:

Awakening

by **Brian Andreas** In those days, we finally chose to walk like giants & hold the world in arms grown strong with love & there may be many things we forget in the days to come, but this will not be one of them.

I put these words on the bulletin cover because they express so beautifully what I hear **Jesus** saying in yesterday's gospel reading. In John 14, Jesus is speaking to his disciples the night before Rome will put him on a cross and the world his followers have known together since Jesus called them is shattered. In spite of the crisis they are facing, Jesus tells them, "I am leaving you well and whole. That's my parting gift to you. Peace." (John 14.26, The Message)

As I said yesterday, I believe Jesus is telling his followers, "Our lives together have shown you how to be well, whole, and at-peace regardless of what's going on around you. Don't let the violence and cruelty of the world harden your hearts. Don't let the world around you cause you to forget who you are and what you are living for. You know how to choose to live well, whole, and at-peace."

Why does Jesus know they can make this choice to reject the ways of the world around them? Because in their lives together, Jesus had given them experiences of being well, whole, and at-peace. His followers had seen Jesus tear down dividing walls between Jew and Samaritan. They had experienced joy and life. On the same night Jesus shares these words with them, he washes their feet, so their bodies remember what love feels like, and he calls on them to love each other like that. Then Jesus tells them after he is gone, the Spirit will fill them and help them remember all they experienced with Jesus. In this way, they can resist all the ways the world tries to seduce them into believing violence, cruelty, and fear are how the real world works, so they'd better just go along. And they've experienced all these ways of being well and whole and at-peace *in community*. They know they cannot embody inclusion,

From the Council

To keep the congregation informed about what Redeemer's Church Council is doing, each month look for an article that summarizes the significant matters before the Council.

The Immigration and Sanctuary Task Force has been gathering information about specific problems immigrants face, and the experience of other churches that have provided sanctuary. Although the group does not believe housing immigrants in our building is feasible, the group is looking for other ways to provide support.

The parking lot resurfacing is complete!

Council has approved installing automatic door openers for the restroom doors. In addition, the configuration will be changed so the doors will open in, rather than out into the hallway as they do now.

Redeemer may become a cooling center this summer. The city is looking for places to serve as cooling centers. Council views this as another way to offer welcome and hospitality to vulnerable people in the area. The Outreach Team will manage the details. Look for an article about this and members are asked to consider offering some time to help host. We can only do this if Redeemer has people present.

Council approved the Berwick Civic Association request to use our parking lot as a recycling drop off place for unwanted electronics. This event will take place on <u>Wednesday, May 28</u> from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. (See separate article, this issue of *Reflections*.)

Summer Book Group to Read/Discuss Book on James Baldwin

Pastor Dave wrote in the April 28 issue of *Reflections:* "I don't know how many of us at Redeemer have read anything by **James Baldwin**. Baldwin (1924-1987) has been called the best-known Black writer during the period of the Civil Rights Movement in the United States. Even though he died almost 40 years ago, more and more writers in this country are looking back to him to try to understand how the unwillingness among White people to look honestly at our country's treatment of Black people keeps us from healing and being able truly to become a country whose laws and attitudes reflect we truly believe that 'all are created equal.'

"This summer, we will do a deep dive into the thoughts, words, and faith of Baldwin as we read *The Gospel According to James Baldwin*: What America's Great Prophet Can Teach Us about Life, Love, and Identity. At just under 200 pages, this 2024 work was written by Greg Garrett, whom BBC Radio has called "one of America's essential voices on religion and culture." Beginning <u>Wednesday, July 9</u> and then on July 23, 30 and Aug. 6, we will read and discuss this book from 7-8:30 p.m. in-person and on Zoom."

Non-Police Crisis Response Ballot Initiative Moves Ahead

Michele Disbro announced Sunday that the petitions are available for the local ballot initiative to create the nonpolice crisis response in the city. The goal is to collect 50,000 valid signatures by **Friday, June 27**. Registered voters who live in the city of Columbus can sign the petition. "The benchmark used is if you can vote in the mayoral race, you live in the city of Columbus. If you match this description, please consider signing. We will have them available to sign in the Narthex after church."

Kristi Hildebrand added, "To collect signatures, you only need to be 18 or older. There are no requirements to validate signatures and that can be done from home. If you are interested in collecting signatures or validating signatures, please see **Kristi Hildebrand** or **Michele Disbro**."

Columbus Safety Collective Campaign - FAQs answered

Q. What is The Community Crisis Response Amendment?

A. A city charter amendment that will provide the Department of Public Safety the authority to establish a division of community crisis response that will

- Oversee the training of community responders

- Oversee the management and administration of services in coordination with other departments and programs within City government and coordinate City programs with other community programs

- Respond to 911 calls and other calls for assistance with non-violent crises, where appropriate
- Conduct community outreach

- Establish the community crisis response advisory board to make recommendations to the Department of Public Safety regarding the implementation of this amendment and provision of its services and funds the division.

joy, life, and love on their own. They need each other to do that. They need each other to hold the world in arms grown strong with love, because sometimes they will feel strong enough to love in that way, and sometimes they will feel so broken they will need others in the community to hold them in that strong love.

And yesterday I celebrated how all of you hold the world in arms grown strong with love.

As we mark the beginning of June, and the coming of the Pride Parade on June 14, I remember again your remarkable, and even miraculous, embrace of people like me which you declared by becoming a Reconciling in Christ (RIC) congregation 33 years ago – way before most ELCA congregations had even heard of this movement, let alone taken the risk to invite their community into conversations about their attitudes toward lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people. You had done that, and you'd chosen to go public as a place of genuine, heartfelt welcome of them ... of us. Most of you know you were the first RIC congregation in the state of Ohio. You. You. If the ELCA bishops in Ohio had been asked which congregation in this state would be the first to declare themselves RIC, would any have named Redeemer?

But you did it. You did it. And you're still doing it. You're still holding this world in arms grown strong with loving. You continue to keep looking at who our government and some faith communities continue to give us permission to hate – even tell us it's our duty to hate. And you're loving them. You are loving them. It is remarkable. It is miraculous.

As we mark Pride Day on June 14, as hundreds of Lutherans march down High Street, embodying the inclusion, joy, life, love, and community that is Jesus' gift to all his followers, I thank you, Redeemer, for your courage, your openness, your adventuresomeness, your trust, your leaders throughout your history, and the Spirit who helps you never forget who you are and how you want to live.

Your arms continue to grow stronger and stronger in love. You keep choosing to love. What a brilliant way to resist all the ways the world is trying to convince us Jesus is calling us to go along with the violence, cruelty, and fear that this world is built on.

Pastoral Letter from Bishop Eaton on Election of Pope Leo XIV

"We of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America join with people around the world in praying for the ministry of **Pope Leo XIV**. We rejoice with the people of the Roman Catholic Church, especially those in our communities, as they joyfully receive their new shepherd.

"Today we witnessed the historic election of the first Augustinian and the first U.S.-born pope — only the second to come from the Americas. Thus we share with him both context and theological roots (**Martin Luther** was also an Augustinian). We pray that this will provide us, as Catholics and as Lutherans, with an opportunity to strengthen our visible unity in Christ through dialogue and cooperation for the life of the world.

"In his first appearance on the balcony of St. Peter's Basilica, the new pope extended the blessing of **Pope Francis**, saying: 'God loves us, all of us, evil will not prevail. We are all in the hands of God. Without fear, united, hand in hand with God and among ourselves, we will go forward. We are disciples of Christ, Christ goes before us, and the world needs His light. Humanity needs Him like a bridge to reach God and His love. You help us to build bridges with dialogue and encounter so we can all be one people always in peace.'

"We pray that the Holy Spirit will sustain Pope Leo XIV for the ministry to which he has been called, and will strengthen us all in our vocations as bridge-builders and as witnesses to God's love for all people and creation."

Considering Ways to Support Immigrants

Church Council has appointed **Julie Johnson** to lead a new ministry group to explore ways Redeemer can support those seeking to immigrate legally to or to remain legally in the United States. People on this ministry group include **Elaine Disbro, Kelley Frank, Emily Ott, Karen Rider** and **Dave Shull**.

The ELCA is a "Sanctuary Denomination." As the ELCA website states: "In its simplest form, becoming a sanctuary denomination means that the ELCA is publicly declaring that walking alongside immigrants and refugees is a matter of faith."

Among the tasks the ministry group has identified are the following:

- Keeping informed of the rapid changes affecting specific refugee and immigrant groups initiated by the Trump administration.
- > Keeping informed of the legal actions and the status of those actions.
- Ensuring that those we know who are potentially affected have access to resources to help them.
- Learning about the various ways that Redeemer can consider how to be a sanctuary to immigrants and refugees.
- > Learning what churches in our area are doing and have done to support immigrants and refugees.
- Exploring what the implications and factors would be in considering all of the options that we might be called upon to consider.
- Reporting our findings to the Congregation Council.

"One immediate way that individuals and Redeemer can walk along with immigrants at this critical time is by supporting CRIS Ohio. The Community Refugee and Immigration Services (CRIS) is a nonprofit agency in Central Ohio that provides a variety of services to refugees and immigrants. "The quickest way to support CRIS is directly through either their website at <u>crisohio.org</u> or by calling 614-235-5747. You can also donate by writing a check to Redeemer and note in the memo line CRIS. Donations through Redeemer are usually delayed by at least a month.

"Another way that Redeemer is walking alongside immigrants is to be of assistance to those who worship with us. Whether through transportation to church, providing a bulletin in their language, connecting them to needed services or helping with daily needs, we have opportunities to help. We ask for your prayers as we continue in this work."

31 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Upstate New York and West Virginia-Western Maryland synods, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and inspire them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders and encourage one another to proclaim the gospel and serve our neighbors in need.

June 1 Pray that our words and actions will glorify God and reflect the immeasurable, unprejudiced grace God has shown humankind through the gift of Jesus Christ.

2 *Pride Month* Give thanks to God for the gifts, wisdom, leadership and faith of our LGBTQIA+ neighbors and siblings in Christ. Ask the Spirit to embolden us as we work together for justice, total inclusion and love for humanity in all its diversity.

Accepted items include the following: aluminum scrap, automotive parts, battery chargers, cables, CD/DVDs, cell phones, iPads and iPhones, battery backups, computers and computer parts, digital clocks, DVD/Blu-Ray platers, hard drives, floppy drives, household electronics, keyboards and mice, laptops, lithium-ion batteries, video game systems, overhead projectors, power tools, printers, recording devices, routers, speakers, steel scrap, stereo equipment, and telecom equipment, among other items.

Items that will NOT be accepted include the following: e-cigarettes, light bulbs, chemicals, smoke detectors, alkaline batteries, paints, aerosol/pressure air canisters, refrigerators, microwaves, and air conditioners.
