Anchored in Grace ... Freed to Serve

Editor's Note: The following is from **Wendy Stoica**, who along with **Brad Phillips** and **Pastor Dave** served as Redeemer's delegates to the weekend Synod Assembly for the Southern Ohio Synod.

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Remember, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." Matthew 28:19-20

The theme of the biannual Southern Ohio Synod Assembly was "Stronger and Better Together: Joining Jesus in Restoring the World." We met at the African Event Center at the Columbus Zoo with a view of the giraffe yard – spectacular! We acknowledged Central Ohio as the traditional homeland of the Shawnee, Miami, Wyandotte and other Indigenous Nations, honoring their stewardship of this land.

While the assembly is designed to conduct official synod business, e.g., elections, budget, committee and team reports, for me it is an opportunity to tell faith stories of the past and inspire hope for the future. My husband Tim and I moved from Indianola, Iowa, to Columbus to attend Trinity Lutheran Seminary. It was the best years of our marriage, living in seminary housing and making lifelong friends with five years of classmates and their families. Even 27 years later, I get excited about synod assemblies and youth gatherings for opportunities to be with ALL my friends from our seminary days.

The synod is now 10 years away from the start of the THRIVE campaign that funded new creative and inspiring ministries. Raising leaders is vital to our Church's thriving future as we continue to make disciples, calling and equipping servant leaders for rostered ministry. The Leadership Academy is preparing Lay Worship Leaders and Synod Authorized Ministers to serve churches across the synod when traditional leadership is not feasible.

Youth ministry continues to evolve by broadening synod wide opportunities for youth and families to engage. **Gary Pecuch** traveled to all but one of the synod's churches to learn and understand their faith stories and how they connect youth and family ministry. He offers us a school calendar of events for 2025-26. In August as a back-to-school event, Epiphany Centerville/Austin will host Messy Games for grades 5-12. After hosting the event for a few neighboring churches over the last 10 years, Epiphany invites all synod youth to come and get messy. HopeWood Outdoors continues to focus on fun education events and confirmation retreats for youth and their leaders. Redeemer is among many churches with small numbers of youth, and we greatly benefit from connecting with others to learn and experience community together. Jacobs Porch at Ohio State University is expanding to Cincinnati this year as a model for campus ministry that welcomes college students who just want to learn and wrestle with faith whether they are Lutheran, Presbyterian, Methodist, or Episcopal. I will always be grateful for the Lutheran campus ministry at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point where I first considered a family could include non-blood relatives.

By Saturday afternoon I had hugged, laughed and cried with my old and new friends. We were awed by the wildlife around us as we embark on a journey of rediscovery, focusing on the transformative power of sharing our faith stories as authentic witnesses to Jesus.

Remembrance Garden Update

Mary Benis asks, "Have you seen the north side of the building lately? The promised landscaping was installed last week, and suddenly the Remembrance Garden has come to life. It's simply beautiful! But there's more to come -- the St. Francis statue needs to be installed in the pet area, and the cross is due to arrive soon. The plan is to celebrate the completion on Sunday, June 22.

"In the meantime we have about \$800 yet to raise to fully fund the landscaping. If you haven't yet participated, please consider a donation soon. We want this effort to reflect the whole congregation, and it would be wonderful to reach the fundraising goal by the June 22 celebration. The donation card is copied at the end of this newsletter, and printed cards are available in the Narthex.

"The task force continues to meet to formulate policies for the garden, planning for such things as signage and lighting. One update to note is that the Memorial Book will include pages for members whose cremains lie elsewhere but whose families choose to honor their connection to Redeemer in this way.

"The task force is also looking for a few individuals who might be willing to help maintain the garden. We're envisioning the need for some occasional weeding, some watering as needed when the rains decrease, and just keeping an eye on things. Summer Book Group to Read/Discuss Book on James Baldwin

Pastor Dave wrote in the April 28 issue of *Reflections:* "I don't know how many of us at Redeemer have read anything by **James Baldwin**. Baldwin (1924-1987) has been called the best-known Black writer during the period of the Civil Rights Movement in the United States. Even though he died almost 40 years ago, more and more writers in this country are looking back to him to try to understand how the unwillingness among White people to look honestly at our country's treatment of Black people keeps us from healing and being able truly to become a country whose laws and attitudes reflect we truly believe that 'all are created equal.'

"This summer, we will do a deep dive into the thoughts, words, and faith of Baldwin as we read *The Gospel According to James Baldwin*: What America's Great Prophet Can Teach Us about Life, Love, and Identity. At just under 200 pages, this 2024 work was written by Greg Garrett, whom BBC Radio has called "one of America's essential voices on religion and culture." Beginning <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>July 9</u> and then on <u>July 16, 23</u> and <u>30</u>, we will read and discuss this book from 7-8:30 p.m. in-person and on Zoom." (Note: the dates have changed!)

Second Summer Book Study Option: This One Led by Staci Stought

If folks are not interested in the book study Redeemer is offering, then they can join seminarian **Staci Stought** – who spoke earlier this year at Redeemer Adult Forums – for a book study on *Surviving God: A New Vision of God through the Eyes of Sexual Abuse Survivors* by **Rev. Dr. Grace Ji-Sun Kim** and **Rev. Dr. Susan Shaw**. This book explores the church's potential to play a vital role in the spiritual healing of those impacted by sexual violence. Whether you're a survivor, an ally, or someone seeking to understand, this book offers valuable insight and guidance. The authors engage harmful and common theologies that are used to excuse or ignore abuse, and instead propose a survivor-centered vision of God; one rooted in justice, compassion, and healing. Come join the conversation about how faith communities can become places of healing in response to the common and overlooked wounds carried by our neighbors.

This group will meet on <u>Wednesdays July 9, 16, 23</u>, and <u>30</u> at 6:30 p.m. at Messiah Lutheran Church (1200 Waggoner Rd, Reynoldsburg). Staci, a retired sexual assault police officer and a current Luther Seminary student, will help to facilitate the study. Non-Police Crisis Response Ballot Initiative Moves Ahead

Michele Disbro announced Sunday that the petitions are available for the local ballot initiative to create the non-police crisis response in the city. The goal is to collect 50,000 valid signatures by **Friday, June 27**. Registered voters who live in the city of Columbus can sign the petition. "The benchmark used is if you can vote in the mayoral race, you live in the city of Columbus. If you match this description, please consider signing. We will have them available to sign in the Narthex after church."

Kristi Hildebrand added, "To collect signatures, you only need to be 18 or older. There are no requirements to validate signatures and that can be done from home. If you are interested in collecting signatures or validating signatures, please see **Kristi Hildebrand** or **Michele Disbro**."

The Columbus Safety Collective Campaign this week released the following endorsements from local and statewide partner organizations, all of whom have pledged support for an alternative-police response program to meet the mental health and safety needs of community members in crisis. Southern Ohio Synod Re-Elects Dillahunt Bishop

The Southern Ohio Synod announced the 2025 Southern Ohio Synod Assembly re-elected **Bishop Suzanne Darcy Dillahunt** to a six-year term as Bishop of the synod!

She was re-elected on the first ballot, receiving 171 votes; 169 votes were necessary for election.

ELCA Social Message on Child Protection

Jesus' call of welcome in Matthew 19:13-14 points to the church's responsibilities toward children. Yet too many children today experience not welcome and safety but traumatic abuse and neglect. The ELCA's draft social message on child protection addresses this crisis and outlines the church's sacred responsibility to protect and nurture children.

This special event is a family-friendly celebration of the strength, beauty, and cultures of the refugees and immigrants in our community, featuring global arts and crafts activities for families, as well as music, food, and dance from around the world.

Considering Ways to Support Immigrants

Church Council has appointed **Julie Johnson** to lead a new ministry group to explore ways Redeemer can support those seeking to immigrate legally to or to remain legally in the United States. People on this ministry group include **Elaine Disbro, Kelley Frank, Emily Ott, Karen Rider** and **Dave Shull**.

The ELCA is a "Sanctuary Denomination." As the ELCA website states: "In its simplest form, becoming a sanctuary denomination means that the ELCA is publicly declaring that walking alongside immigrants and refugees is a matter of faith."

Among the tasks the ministry group has identified are the following:

- ➤ Keeping informed of the rapid changes affecting specific refugee and immigrant groups initiated by the Trump administration.
- ➤ Keeping informed of the legal actions and the status of those actions.
- > Ensuring that those we know who are potentially affected have access to resources to help them.
- ➤ Learning about the various ways that Redeemer can consider how to be a sanctuary to immigrants and refugees.
- > Learning what churches in our area are doing and have done to support immigrants and refugees.
- Exploring what the implications and factors would be in considering all of the options that we might be called upon to consider.
- ➤ Reporting our findings to the Congregation Council.

"One immediate way that individuals and Redeemer can walk along with immigrants at this critical time is by supporting CRIS Ohio. The Community Refugee and Immigration Services (CRIS) is a nonprofit agency in Central Ohio that provides a variety of services to refugees and immigrants. "The quickest way to support CRIS is directly through either their website at crisohio.org or by calling 614-235-5747. You can also donate by writing a check to Redeemer and note in the memo line CRIS. Donations through Redeemer are usually delayed by at least a month.

"Another way that Redeemer is walking alongside immigrants is to be of assistance to those who worship with us. Whether through transportation to church, providing a bulletin in their language, connecting them to needed services or helping with daily needs, we have opportunities to help. We ask for your prayers as we continue in this work."
