- Whenever the cross is carried in procession through the congregation, we turn to face the cross to signify our way of life as followers of Jesus.



Reading Genesis 18:1-15 (The Message, inclusivized)

A reading from the book of Genesis

God appeared to Abraham at the Oaks of Mamre while Abraham was sitting at the entrance of his tent. It was the hottest part of the day. He looked up and saw three people standing. He ran from his tent to greet them and bowed before them.

He said, "If it please you, stop for a while with your servant. I'll get some water so you can wash your feet. Rest under this tree. I'll get some food to refresh you on your way, since your travels have brought you across my path."

They said, "Certainly. Go ahead."

Abraham hurried into the tent to Sarah. He said, "Hurry. Get three cups of our best flour; knead it and make bread."

Then Abraham ran to the cattle pen and picked out a nice plump calf and gave it to the servant who lost no time getting it ready. Then he got curds and milk, brought them with the calf that had been roasted, set the meal before the visitors, and stood there under the tree while they ate.

The visitors said to him, "Where is Sarah your wife?"

He said, "In the tent."

One of them said, "I'm coming back about this time next year. When I arrive, your wife Sarah will have a son." Sarah was listening at the tent opening, just behind the man.

Abraham and Sarah were old by this time, very old. Sarah was far past the age for having babies. Sarah laughed within herself, "An old woman like me? Get pregnant? With this old man of a husband?"

God said to Abraham, "Why did Sarah laugh saying, 'Me? Have a baby? An old woman like me?' Is anything too hard for God? I'll be back about this time next year and Sarah will have a baby."

Sarah lied. She said, "I didn't laugh," because she was afraid.

But God said, "Yes you did; you laughed."

May we open ourselves to what the Spirit is saying to the church. Amen.




Sharing the peace

Members are encouraged to move around the sanctuary to greet each with a hearty handshake or a hug.



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Great Thanksgiving


The Lord be with you. Lift up your hearts.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

- It is a joy to give you our thanks and praise, Glorious God. You are before all things; you are beyond all things; and in the midst of all things and all peoples you have made yourself known.

Whoever you are, from wherever you come, whatever you believe, you are welcome and invited to receive. Come! For all things are now ready.


Please be seated


