## Looking through the Tear – *The Whole Story*

*Those of you who read my front-page article last week may have finished it and thought, “Well, THAT was kind of thin ....” For a reason that even my IT husband can’t explain, when I sent Judy the article I’d written for last week’s front page, only about one-third of it arrived to Judy. So I’m sending the whole thing for this issue – and will be sure it gets to Judy intact!*

The Spirituality Network is the name of the organization that runs the spiritual direction certification program I’ve been part of for the past year. In their August newsletter, a friend of mine from this program named **Luke McCusker** wrote an article called “House Finches.” He’s given me permission to quote from it.

In the article, Luke describes discovering a pair of house finches building a nest behind a petunia in the corner of his window box. Soon there are four eggs. Two hatch, with “each baby body 75 percent mouth reaching up and swaying and jerking” for food. He writes, “A friend I told called it a blessing on my home and that is how it felt. I have made a nurturing place here. I am doing something right.”

Luke continues the story:

“Two days later, the nest was empty. A predator took them, and it left a house finch-sized tear in the fabric of my assumptions about the world. Can animals be evil? Was the predator feeding its own babies? Should I have protected the birds? Could I have? Should I become vegan? Of course, this is not just about birds. When I look through the tear, I see a reality that does not care what I expect or assume. Its ugliness hurts and offends me and its shimmering beauty scares me because I am afraid it will be lost. I want to look away. “But my life is here, in this world, and I want to be in my life. So I have not removed the nest, a place where possibility and loss overlapped. I am lingering at the tear. I am looking through it into a big, deep, dark, bright, ugly, beautiful, pulsing, true world. And with disappointment, or trepidation, or on my knees in trembling or in gratitude, holding tenderness and violence and everything in between, I say, ‘yes.’”

I think one of the hardest things about growing up is that we gain more life experiences. And those experiences cause us to let go of some of our most cherished assumptions about the world. It takes incredible courage to admit something has torn a hole right through one of our assumptions and to be willing to look through that tear. That takes tremendous courage because once we look through that tear, we can’t unlook. We have to admit that something precious has been lost, that a certainty we were so sure of has been torn away. And we are left bereft ... able only to grieve that loss and face a new world that suddenly seems frightening and unpredictable. And though a part of us knows we need to say “yes” to this new reality in order to move forward, a part of us is terrified of that, even though we know trying to pretend our shredded assumption is still valid is no way to live.

When Jesus opened the eyes of people who were blind, I think this is part of what he was doing. He was inviting them to risk leaving behind the assumptions they so wanted to live by ... and open their eyes to see the reality right in front of them.

The center is a "gender-based violence recovery center where at-risk women and their children are provided shelter, health care, legal representation, and education. Children are nurtured and empowered through primary school at Rehoboth Learning Centre while at-risk women will be employed and educated on our sustainable teaching farm."

## **LSS Food Pantry Seeks Produce Donations**

In light of reductions in the state of Ohio budget resulting in less funds for Ohio foodbanks, Lutheran Social Services (LSS) reports that they recently learned that Mid-Ohio Food Collective has had to make the difficult decision to eliminate its daily produce shop-through service provided to food pantries for the month of July. While LSS Food Pantries will still receive produce from MOFC; "the removal of this service will significantly reduce the amount of produce we will have to offer the families we serve each week in Franklin and Delaware counties ... create[ing] a gap in the resources for the month of July ...."

As a result, LSS is asking for donations of bags of potatoes, salad kits, bags of grapes and carrots. These items can be taken to the pantry at 1460 S Champion Ave **any Tuesday in July, between 9 a.m.-12 p.m.** OR items can be dropped off at the regularly scheduled volunteer shift, at the Champion Food Pantry. Redeemer is next set to work on **Thursday, Aug. 21.**

## **Looking through the Tear – *The Whole Story***

I think more and more people in this country and around the world are having to do this when it comes to the policies and actions of the Israeli government in Gaza and the West Bank. For decades, a number of voices have tried to get the attention of our policymakers so they might let go of their assumptions that people who have been victims of such horrific hatred and violence would never become the perpetrators of such hatred and violence. But most in this country have refused to believe that. Now, however, the evidence is too strong. Just as seeing police dogs attacking non-violent civil rights protestors on the evening news in the 1960s led a large number of people in this country to support national civil and voting rights legislation, so the sight of children starving to death in Gaza is leading more and more people here to let go of our assumptions about any kind of unique morality among the government or citizens of Israel.

When have you experienced a tear in an assumption that sustained you for a number of years? Are you experiencing such a tearing now? What kind of courage did it take you to look through that tear, and admit you had to face a new reality without that assumption? What had to change for you? What became possible because you are no longer basing your life on something that wasn't true?

Luke's story embraces me with the truth that the more assumptions I free myself of, the more I free myself to see all aspects of this world. I don't try to deny certain aspects of it in a futile effort to preserve the myth of some unique kind of nobility, purity, innocence, or morality. If we choose to make our life in this world, and not escape into a false reality, then we look at the tear that has shattered in our assumptions. We look through it into a big, deep, dark, bright, ugly, beautiful, pulsing, true world. And with disappointment, or trepidation, or on [our] knees in trembling or in gratitude, holding tenderness and violence and everything in between, [we] say, 'yes.'"

## The Wider Church

### Yehiel Curry Elected Presiding Bishop, Lucille Mills, Secretary, of ELCA

**Rev. Yehiel Curry** was elected to serve a six-year term as presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) during the 2025 ELCA Churchwide Assembly recently held in Phoenix. In addition, Rev. Lucille “CeCee” Mills was elected to a six-year term as secretary

Speaking to the assembly after his election, Curry reflected on his membership at Shekinah Chapel in Riverdale, IL, where he eventually became a lay mission developer while he participated in the Theological Education for Emerging Ministries [TEEM] program, which prepares individuals for ordained ministry in the ELCA, with a focus on “emerging ministry contexts” like ethnic-specific, multicultural, rural and inner-city settings. He spoke to the assembly about his initial hesitation in accepting that first ministry role.

“Perhaps I’m out there in one of you,” Curry said. “I never saw myself as good enough, so for two years, I said no. I finally said yes. When I said yes, your support, this church’s support, of that ministry meant everything. So if you want to know what your benevolence dollars look like, it looks like me, and I want to say thank you. Thank you for your investment.”

Curry has served as bishop of the ELCA Metropolitan Chicago Synod since 2019. He previously served as mission developer (2009-2012) and pastor (2012-2019) of Shekinah.

He received a Bachelor of Arts from Lewis University in Romeoville, IL, in 1995 and a Master of Divinity from the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago (LSTC) in 2013. LSTC is one of seven ELCA seminaries.

Meanwhile, Mills said, “I have to echo our newly elected presiding bishop [Yehiel Curry] — I’m the product of you. I’m also a TEEM candidate,” Mills said to the assembly following her election.

“I do believe it’s a new season for our church,” Mills said. “I do believe that the reason why I, an African American woman who stands before you with no degrees in a church that cares so much about education ... is because you saw the gifts and potential in me. I celebrate with you that we listen to God’s call and that we will become God’s beloved community.”

Mills has served as an assistant to the bishop in the ELCA North Carolina Synod since 2019. Previously she served as an interim pastor, as program associate for African Descent Ministries with the ELCA churchwide organization in Chicago; and as pastor of Rejoice Lutheran Church, Chesapeake, VA. She received a TEEM certification from Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in Columbia, SC, in 2002.

### Situation in Gaza ‘Dire’

**Julie Johnson** provided the following update on Gaza: “The situation facing the people of Gaza is dire. While the U.S. continues, for the most part to ignore, it’s house-less population and health care isn’t considered a human right, \$3.8 billion a year is gifted to Israel to impose its system of apartheid, which includes periodic massacres in Gaza, on the Palestinian people. As we pledge to act to end racism and inequality at home, we know that our actions can reverberate worldwide. We offer the following “Lamentation for Gaza” from **Rabbi Brant Rosen** of Tzedek Chicago.

#### A Lamentation for Gaza

Gaza weeps alone.  
Bombs falling without end  
her cheeks wet with tears.  
A widow abandoned  
imprisoned on all sides  
with none willing to save her.  
  
We who once knew oppression  
have become the oppressors.  
Those who have been pursued  
are now the pursuers.  
We have uprooted families  
from their homes, we have  
driven them deep into  
this desolate place,  
this narrow strip of exile.

All along the roads there is mourning.  
The teeming marketplaces  
have been bombed into emptiness.  
The only sounds we hear  
are cries of pain  
sirens blaring  
drones buzzing  
bitterness echoing  
into the black vacuum  
of homes destroyed  
and dreams denied.

We have become Gaza's master  
leveling neighborhoods  
with the mere touch of a button  
for her transgression of resistance.  
Her children are born into captivity  
they know us only as occupiers  
enemies to be feared  
and hated.

We have lost all  
that once was precious to us.  
This fatal attachment to our own might  
has become our downfall.  
This idolatrous veneration of the land  
has sent us wandering into  
a wilderness of our own making.

We have robbed Gaza of  
her deepest dignity  
plunged her into sorrow and darkness.  
Her people crowd into refugee camps  
held captive by fences and buffer zones  
gunboats, mortar rounds  
and Apache missiles.

We sing of Jerusalem,  
to "a free people in their own land"  
but our song has become a mockery.  
How can we sing a song of freedom  
imprisoned behind walls we have built  
with our own fear and dread?

Here we sit clinging to our illusions  
of comfort and security  
while we unleash hell on earth  
on the other side of the border.  
We sit on hillsides and cheer  
as our explosions light up the sky  
while far below, whole neighborhoods  
are reduced to rubble.

For these things I weep:  
for the toxic fear we have unleashed  
from the dark place of our hearts  
for the endless grief  
we are inflicting  
on the people of Gaza.

## **Prayer Concerns from ELCA**

**August 12 International Youth Day** Half the people on our planet are age 30 or younger. Pray for every nation to honor the gifts of young people, address the challenges they face and provide easy access to resources that contribute to their physical, spiritual, emotional, intellectual and economic well-being.

**13** Ask God to bless those who have chosen to use their gifts, faith and time in long-term volunteer service with Lutheran Volunteer Corps, Urban Servant Corps, Holden Village or other domestic ministries.

**14** Open our hearts and minds to see problems in the world as opportunities to encourage and care for one another, to seek new paths toward justice and peace, and to share the good news of God's mercy and love for humanity.

**15** "Go my children, with my blessing, never alone. Waking, sleeping, I am with you, you are my own. In my love's baptismal river I have made you mine forever." (*WOV* 721). Praise God for being ever present in our lives and the world — in times of turmoil, peace, fear, joy, failure and achievement.

**16** Pray for students attending ELCA colleges, universities and seminaries, and other institutions of higher education, that they will grow in faith, knowledge, wisdom and commitment to serve others.

**17** Ask the Spirit how we might align ourselves with the commandments, desires and priorities of God, the very things Jesus made clear to us through his life, suffering, death and resurrection.

**18** Pray for the church leaders gathering for the Ecumenical School on Governance, Economics, and Management for an Economy of Life in Seoul, South Korea. Organized by the World Council of Churches, the Lutheran World Federation and other ecumenical organizations, the school helps leaders to bridge theology and economics and to advocate for a global economic system that meets the needs of humanity and responds to the crises we face today.
