The Time to Retire

With this column, I'm letting you know I've decided it is time for me to retire from parish ministry. My last day as your pastor will be **Sunday**, **December 28**, **2025**.

Since coming to Redeemer in September 2017, you have called out of me the best I've had to give – often more than I knew I had. I have loved this work. Beginning in Epiphany this year, however, I started to notice my energy and creativity were fading. Now well into the season of Pentecost, that reality has not changed. Though I am confident I will bring my best to you for the rest of this year, it is clear to me I no longer have the on-going energy and creativity you need and deserve from your pastor.

When I arrived at Redeemer a bit over eight years ago, part of me had trouble believing you would fully accept a non-Lutheran as your pastor. You showed me how little faith I had! You reached out to me and invited me into your lives. You participated in worship, attended classes, and shared your dreams about what Redeemer might become. In honest, respectful ways, you expressed your frustrations and disappointments about where you saw Redeemer going. You challenged me to be more courageous in what I said and did. You thanked me. You forgave me.

You let me become your pastor.

My eight years with you have continued to reveal to me that you are a wonderfully adventurous group of Jesus-followers whom I will deeply miss being with.

I don't know of any faith community with hearts as big as yours. Whether you learn of a need from someone in the pew next to you or half a world away, your responses consistently make the love of Jesus real to them in life-changing ways. After other congregations have let people know they aren't wanted or don't matter, when they walk through the doors of Redeemer, your open-armed welcome conveys the message: "Don't let anyone ever tell you you are anything less than beautiful!"

Long before I became your pastor, this is who you were. No matter whom you next call "Pastor," this is who you will be. Because this is who you are.

Congregation Council President Brad Binau will have an article in next week's *Reflections* to address some practical questions about next steps into your shared future. I am extraordinarily grateful for his leadership this year, and for the leadership and commitment of the Executive Team, Council, ministry team members, and our remarkable staff.

We still have three-and-a-half months together. I promise I will be available to you in whatever ways will help the end of my time with you feel honest, loving, healing, and complete.

My formal path as a parish pastor began when I was ordained at Broad Street Presbyterian Church 38 years ago. There is no community with whom I would rather bring this path to a close than Redeemer.

Thank you for letting me be your pastor.

I recently shared my perceptions about our announcements with other members of the Executive Committee. We agreed that even when announcements keep us in our pews a few minutes longer than anticipated it is a sign of our congregational vitality that we have so much ministry to talk about! And we sensed that our community grows stronger when we learn who is doing what to further Redeemer's mission to be "followers of Jesus, sharing God's love with all."

As summer gives way to fall, our life together will intensify and there will be more to share about how we can live out Christian calling. That's a good reason to be succinct in sharing our good news, but it's also a reason to celebrate how much good news we have to share!

Justice Team Rebirth!

Mary Benis writes, "Many years ago a good many of us got energized about an earlier Issue 1, which tried to decrease incarceration by reclassifying many minor drug offenses. Emily Ott got us connected to a local community activist, and we were off to the races, or more accurately the petitions.

"Back in 2018 we called ourselves the Justice Team, and we covered a LOT of topics -- the sanctuary movement of that time, racial disparities, police reform, affordable housing, structural racism, and much more. Some of us plugged in on the summer book studies; some of us didn't but stayed engaged nonetheless.

"During that time, the congregation decided to rejoin BREAD, and some turned their energy to that. But others kept going by email – sharing links to articles or presentations or books or news. Then as sometimes happens, conversations slowed and eventually stopped.

"Fast forward to today, when we have some folks working on immigration again, and now there's another ballot issue of concern, even as someone else is wanting to explore problems related to poverty. We are clearly a congregation that cares about social justice!

"Given that reality, it seems the right time to reactivate our Justice Team as an umbrella email group to facilitate the sharing of justice causes or concerns. It may be that several folks will share the same passion around an issue and will form their own subgroup. Others may use the forum just to share their outrage, with no action needed—just shared outrage.

"We have set up the team with a specific Redeemer email address, JusticeTeam@RedeemerLuth.com, so that one email can connect to everyone on the team. It can function however its users want it to -- no meetings required, just a chance to share with other like-minded folks. "If you're interested in such a group, just let the church office know to add your name to the team. Our efforts can make a difference!"

'Noisy Offering' to Go to Kenyan Rescue Centre

Kay Ernsthausen reports that Redeemer's "Noisy Offering" will go to Sikhona Rescue Centre in Kitengela, Kenya. According to Kay, this is a registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit dedicated to provide a physically and psychologically safe space for abused women and neglected children to learn and grow.

The center is a "gender-based violence recovery center where at-risk women and their children are provided shelter, health care, legal representation, and education. Children are nurtured and empowered through primary school at Rehoboth Learning Centre while at-risk women will be employed and educated on our sustainable teaching farm."

"Sikhona" translates from Zulu to mean, "I Exist"

Julie Johnson Provides Update on Middle East

Julie Johnson reports, "At least 63,746 Palestinians have been confirmed dead since Israel's war on Gaza began. Thousands of others are still buried in the rubble.

"The World Health Organization chief has urged Israel to stop the 'catastrophe' of people starving to death in Gaza, saying at least 370 people have died from malnutrition since the war began.

"This is a catastrophe that Israel could have prevented and could stop at any time," **Tedros Adhanom Ghebrevesus** told reporters.

"'Starvation of civilians as a method of war is a war crime that can never be tolerated: doing so in one conflict risks legitimizing its use in future conflicts,' he said. His comments came two weeks after the United Nations declared a famine in Gaza, blaming the 'systematic obstruction' of humanitarian deliveries by Israel.

"Amnesty International warned Israel's escalating assault on Gaza City will have 'catastrophic and irreversible consequences' for Palestinians.

"Saudi Arabia's Foreign Ministry has condemned repeated statements by **Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu** about forcibly displacing Palestinians from their land, including through the Rafah border crossing that Israeli forces completely sealed.

"Belgian Foreign Minister Maxime Prevot says the EU's credibility on foreign policy is 'collapsing' because of the bloc's failure to act over Israel's war on Gaza.

"The Health Ministry in Gaza reported 373 people, including 134 children, have died from starvation and malnutrition in the besieged Palestinian territory since the war there erupted in October 2023.

"Tedros repeated the number and said it included 'more than 300 just in the past two months.'

"People are starving to death while the food that could save them sits on trucks a short distance away. The most intolerable part of this man-made disaster is that it could be stopped right now."
