What's Next? *Anticipation and Celebration!*

When the stewardship team chose its theme for this year, "Meeting the Moment Together," none of us knew that this would mean meeting the moment of pastoral transition at Redeemer. With **Pastor Dave's** announcement of his retirement at the end of the year, we have stepped together into a liminal moment – a place between one space and another space, a space between our past and our future. In this liminal moment we will inevitably anticipate what comes next. But primarily the next three months are a time to celebrate eight incredibly faithful and productive years of Pastor Dave's ministry. Thanks be to God for bringing Dave Shull to Redeemer!

I'm writing to share some information about what we can anticipate, but first I ask that we do our best to stay in the moment and meet it together in celebration. Let's do our best between now and the end of the year to create a time of good leave taking for Pastor Dave. Let's be intentional with our words of thanks, express any regrets that we feel are important to share, and say our goodbyes with hope and humor. And let's undergird everything we do with prayer. Our Member Care team is planning a farewell celebration for Pastor Dave on **Sunday, Dec. 14** after worship. Look for more details in the coming weeks.

And what might we anticipate? When Pastor Dave shared with me his plan to retire, we agreed that it would be good for me, in my role as congregation president, to speak with **Pastor Bob Abrams** of the Southern Ohio Synod staff and seek his advice on how we might best move forward in faith as the people of God. Pastor Abrams will be the staff person working with us during our time of transition. He will be with us to preach the good news on **Sunday, Nov. 9**. Based in part on what I learned from my conversation with him, let me share what I think we can anticipate.

Our congregational constitution will guide us in forming a call committee and moving through the process of issuing a call to Redeemer's next Pastor. Council will appoint a committee of five to eight members and ask the congregation to ratify those appointments at our Congregation meeting on **Nov. 23**. The call committee will not begin its work until January, however.

Sometime in January or February, Pastor Abrams and **Bishop Suzanne Dillahunt** will meet with the Council and the call committee. Sometime in February we hope to be served by an interim pastor, appointed by the bishop and approved by Council. During January we will have a series of supply preachers and we will arrange for pastoral care coverage until an interim pastor is in place.

We should anticipate a period of months, not weeks, (but hopefully not years!) before our next pastor is called and installed. Our first task, led by the call committee following Pastor Dave's departure, will be to complete the ELCA's "Ministry Site Profile" (MSP). This paperwork will explain who we are demographically, the status of our finances, our vision for mission, and our anticipated leadership needs. The MSP helps us clarify our hopes for the future, it assists the synod in suggesting candidates who may be a good fit, and it allows potential candidates to measure their

Online donations are preferred, but cash and checks made out to CWS/CROP are also welcome.

"Please help make our team effort a success!" Connie reported Sunday that the Redeemer team has already raised over \$14,500 and that the church has the fourth highest total in the country.

Redeemer Garden Saturday Giveaways Conclude

The Redeemer Community Garden Giveaways wrapped up another great season of growing and giving away produce. **Michele Disbro** reports, "Our last giveaway was Saturday, Sept. 20. The last few weeks have been tough due to the drought but we'll still have some produce to share with the congregation each Sunday.

"Thanks to all our volunteers who helped pick and giveaway the produce: **Kathy Zwanziger, Helen Brunston, Shirley Meyer, Kampbell Turner, Dave Lippert, Kay Ernsthausen, Sue Yehling, Diane Brobeck, and the In-Phillips family**.

"We also appreciated the help and donations by many of our Berwick neighbors. A big shout out to **Sue Yehling** who helped keep the garden watered throughout the summer.

"Next year, we are hoping to replace some of the mesh bags used to cover the tomatoes (to keep the squirrels from taking a bite out of the tomatoes). **We are looking for small mesh bags often used for onions**. It would be helpful if the bags were still intact and not ripped open. You can see a sample bag on the table where produce is laid out. We'll be collecting them throughout the year to prepare for the 2026 growing season."

From the Council

To keep the congregation informed about what your Council is doing, each month look for an article that summarizes the significant matters before the Council.

As **Pastor Dave** has announced, he will be retiring from parish ministry at the end of 2025. Council received a briefing from **Congregation President Brad Binau** about the process of getting an interim pastor and setting up a committee to search for a new pastor. **Bob Abrams** from the synod office will lead us through the process. Council will suggest persons for the call committee and will ask the congregation to ratify those suggestions at our **Nov. 23** congregational meeting. (See Brad's separate article in this issue of *Reflections* which provides more detailed information about the call process.)

Some of the immigrant support funding was used to hire an attorney for RLC's immigrant family. The immigration hearing scheduled for Sept. 9 was cancelled. A future hearing is not expected until 2027. "We are grateful that our commitment to immigrant support has already been used to help."

The executive committee, consisting of **Brad Binau, Ashley Bird, Laura Warren and Rich Pautsch**, will serve as the nominating committee for new council members in 2026. Currently they are looking for a vice president, stewardship and property representatives. In addition, they are looking for two people to serve on an internal audit

committee. “If you have interest in serving any of these roles, we invite you to speak with a member of the committee.”

The **Nov. 23** Congregational meeting will include the election of Council members for 2026, the election of two Special Funds Team members, and the ratification of the members of the Call Committee. In addition, the updated constitution is expected to be ready for the congregation to ratify.

Non Police Crisis Response Update

Kristi Hildebrand provides the following update from BREAD: “The Non Police Crisis Response team is working toward getting on the May 2026 ballot. They have collected over 21,000 signatures. They are working on validating those signatures while still collecting more.

“Paid signature collectors have been hired. OhioVotes provided a grant for the paid signature collectors who are door knocking in neighborhoods, such as Linden and West Gate.

“They have strong opposition from the Franklin alcohol, drug, and mental health board [ADAMH Board]. **Erika Clark-Jones**, the director, contends that the board has already implemented this system. The system in place is only for behavioral health calls, and currently, the program handles approximately 80 calls monthly.

“The city of Columbus’s 911 number averages over 100 calls daily, and these calls include behavioral health issues, housing crises, food insecurity, and the need for wellness checks.

“We are hoping to write an op ed piece, have a press conference, and hold a town hall to counter these claims. **Tiara Ross**, a candidate for city council, is urging her supporters not to sign the petition. We are hoping the feature speaker at the town hall will be the Law Enforcement Active Partners, a coalition of retired law enforcement officials who have endorsed our ballot initiative.”

'Noisy Offering' to Go to Kenyan Rescue Centre

Kay Ernsthausen reports that Redeemer's "Noisy Offering" will go to Sikhona Rescue Centre in Kitengela, Kenya. According to Kay, this is a registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit dedicated to provide a physically and psychologically safe space for abused women and neglected children to learn and grow.

The center is a "gender-based violence recovery center where at-risk women and their children are provided shelter, health care, legal representation, and education. Children are nurtured and empowered through primary school at Rehoboth Learning Centre while at-risk women will be employed and educated on our sustainable teaching farm."

"Sikhona" translates from Zulu to mean, "I Exist"

27 "Take your Bible and take your newspaper, and read both," wrote Lutheran theologian **Karl Barth** (1886-1968). "But interpret newspapers from your Bible." Ask God to help us attend to our communities, nation and world, and remember that our faith in Jesus Christ calls us to foster peace, justice, love, forgiveness and healing among all people.

28 The story of **Lazarus** and the rich man in the gospels of **Luke** and **John** reminds us of God's love and concern for those who suffer poverty, illness and neglect. Pray that we will embrace all people as neighbors who deserve respect, compassion, love and inclusion.

29 Michael and All Angels Ask the Spirit to help us be aware of God's activity in the world and to strengthen our faith when we are perplexed by the mysteries of God's ways and the presence of angels and spiritual beings who serve as God's messengers.

30 Ask God to bless and guide the work of the ELCA Gender Justice and Women's Empowerment program, informed by the unique voices and experiences of people across race, ethnicity, ability, class, sexuality and age.

Pray for the advancement of gender justice in the church and society — justice grounded in Scripture, Lutheran theology and people of all gender identities working together.

The Community Beyond

Julie Johnson Provides Update on Middle East

Julie Johnson reports, “At least 63,746 Palestinians have been confirmed dead since Israel's war on Gaza began. Thousands of others are still buried in the rubble.

“The World Health Organization chief has urged Israel to stop the ‘catastrophe’ of people starving to death in Gaza, saying at least 370 people have died from malnutrition since the war began.

“This is a catastrophe that Israel could have prevented and could stop at any time,” **Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus** told reporters.

“‘Starvation of civilians as a method of war is a war crime that can never be tolerated: doing so in one conflict risks legitimizing its use in future conflicts,’ he said. His comments came two weeks after the United Nations declared a famine in Gaza, blaming the ‘systematic obstruction’ of humanitarian deliveries by Israel.

“Amnesty International warned Israel’s escalating assault on Gaza City will have ‘catastrophic and irreversible consequences’ for Palestinians.

“Saudi Arabia’s Foreign Ministry has condemned repeated statements by **Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu** about forcibly displacing Palestinians from their land, including through the Rafah border crossing that Israeli forces completely sealed.

“**Belgian Foreign Minister Maxime Prevot** says the EU’s credibility on foreign policy is ‘collapsing’ because of the bloc’s failure to act over Israel’s war on Gaza.

“The Health Ministry in Gaza reported 373 people, including 134 children, have died from starvation and malnutrition in the besieged Palestinian territory since the war there erupted in October 2023.

“Tedros repeated the number and said it included ‘more than 300 just in the past two months.’

“‘People are starving to death while the food that could save them sits on trucks a short distance away. The most intolerable part of this man-made disaster is that it could be stopped right now.’”
