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

2 Timothy 1:8-14 (The Message)

A reading from the second letter to Timothy

Don't be embarrassed to speak up for our Master or for me, his prisoner. Take your share of suffering for the Message along with the rest of us. We can only keep on going, after all, by the power of God, who first saved us and then called us to this holy work. We had nothing to do with it. It was all God's idea, a gift prepared for us in Jesus long before we knew anything about it. But we know it now. Since the appearance of our Savior, nothing could be plainer: death defeated, life affirmed in a steady blaze of light, all through the work of Jesus.

This is the Message I've been set apart to proclaim as preacher, emissary, and teacher. It's also the cause of all this trouble I'm in. But I have no regrets. I couldn't be more sure of my ground—the One I've trusted in can take care of what Christ trusted me to do right to the end.



If you do not wish close contact, offer a sign of blessing to others to let them know you are more comfortable greeting them from a distance.




WE SHARE HOLY COMMUNION

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.


It is right to give our thanks and praise.
