Retirement Ponderings

A month or so ago, you began asking me, “So what are your plans for retirement?” Since more and more of you are asking that question, I thought I’d say a bit about that in this article. Follow-up if you want more details!

Some of you have been surprised when my answer to this question has been so brief. I don’t have any kind of plan laid-out. And that’s because I’m quite comfortable with unstructured time. I’ve kept a weekly sabbath for over 25 years, which means every Friday I have no to-do list. What makes Sabbath Sabbath is going through that day with nothing I “have” to do. I’m sure that has made me someone who is totally relaxed with moving through a day with nothing more scheduled than a coffee and a FaceTime with friends. Having nothing I have to do isn’t the slightest bit stressful for me.

I’m sure there will be times I’m bored, times I will miss the intellectual challenge and creativity of putting together a Sunday morning reflection or a Tuesday afternoon Bible study. I’m sure there will be times I miss the companionship and joy of a small-group discussion or chatting after worship in the Narthex. I will miss being with you all in all the ways we have done that over these eight-plus years together.

So what are my plans for retirement after my last day here on December 28? The short answer I’ve been giving to those of you who’ve asked is, I don’t have many plans! I’m waiting to see what discovers me. Here’s what I know.

The spiritual direction certification program I started in September 2024 continues through December 2026. That means in my first year of retirement, for three Monday evenings a month and one Saturday a month I’ll be working at that program.

At some point, I’ll start exploring different faith communities to see if I find one that feels like a good fit.

I might reach out to see about being trained as a volunteer English Language Learner tutor. I think it could be fun to connect with immigrants who want to learn English.

Because Mike gets so little vacation, I know we will start to take advantage of something pastors can’t: three-day weekends! It opens up a whole new world to think about being able to do that!

Other than that, I am simply looking forward to seeing what stirs when, for the first time since I got a paper route in fifth grade, there is no work I have to do. I’m really curious to see where I find my energy being drawn out of me. I want to stay open to activities and commitments I never imagined I’d say “Yes” to. I take great delight in surprising myself!

Those are some of my responses to the question you’ve been asking me.

As the time for my retirement rapidly approaches, I continue to feel so incredibly lucky to be finishing my career as a pastor with you and the ELCA. As I just said, I take great delight in surprising myself. And ending up serving an ELCA congregation certainly is a huge surprise! Thank you!

'Noisy Offering' to Go to Huckleberry House

Kay Ernsthansen reports that Redeemer's "Noisy Offering" will now go to support Huckleberry House. She notes Huckleberry House provides shelter, support, and guidance to young people facing difficult situations through four main programs:

- A **24/7 Crisis Shelter** offering a temporary safe place to stay for teens ages 12 to 17 including hot meals, a warm bed, and access to necessities like clothes and hygiene items.
- A **Transitional Living Program** for young people, 18-24 years old, providing a safe place to live combined with a range of supportive services.
- A **Counseling Center**, with a team of therapists who specialize working with teens, young adults, and families to help solve even the most challenging problems.
- The **Youth Outreach Program**, a team of trained, professional staff that engage with youth to prevent homelessness and provide support and resources to increase stability.

Currently the Huckleberry House serves all youth between ages 12-24. Youth between the ages of 12-17 are given shelter and programs to prepare them to move to appropriate housing. This program averages 6.5 days to transition one person.

Youth between 18-24 receive housing and services to help them prepare for transitional housing. This program currently averages 18 months to find housing.

With Kaleidoscope's loss of funding for housing, Huckleberry House is the alternative for LGBTQ youth and young adults for housing. Please note: Kaleidoscope is not closing all services; they are only losing the funding for housing. Programs will continue.

Sign Up Now to Read at Worship Services

Readers for Sunday morning services can now sign up for services over the winter. Readers, including youth and children, are encouraged to sign up on the sheet on the bulletin board, next to the Library. Readers are still needed.

Readings are sent out the week before to give folks a chance to go through the lessons ahead of Sunday mornings. **Readers of all ages are encouraged to participate.**

Council Clarifies Policy on Payments to Individuals

The Redeemer Congregation Council has adopted a policy of not disbursing funds directly to individuals with the exception of funds requested by individuals for reimbursement of church related expenses and funds requested in payment for personal services. This was prompted because council has received requests from some members about designating contributions from a particular donor to the Immigration Support Fund or other funds of the church designated to benefit a particular individual. A Letter from Bishop Yehiel Curry: 'In Christ'

When I was installed as your presiding bishop, the preacher proclaimed that in times of division, disruption and fear, God calls us, through love, to lift up one another just as Christ lifts us up. I have taken that to heart and been alert to all the ways in which we, made into God’s own beloved through word and sacrament, testify to that love in daily service and ministry. Across the ELCA, I have seen and am deeply grateful for:

- Ministries mobilizing to serve meals and distribute food amid the harm, chaos and confusion of a government shutdown and the ongoing blocking of food assistance for 42 million people in our nation.
- Congregations offering accompaniment and hope as they come alongside neighbors made vulnerable by aggressive and indiscriminate immigration enforcement.
- Leaders from Lutheran Disaster Response urging members of Congress to commit to programs that lift up those made vulnerable in disasters.
- Congregations reaching out to federal workers by supplying meals, meeting daily needs, providing gift cards and helping them find work.
- Preachers faithfully proclaiming the theology of the cross that illuminates the brokenness of sin but also the mystery of a grace that claims us, frees us and sends us to be messengers of hope in a hurting world.

As a **church**, we do not hold back in lifting up those whom God calls us to serve, even and especially when government abdicates its responsibilities for the common good. My installation as your presiding bishop coincided with the start of the longest government shutdown in our nation's history. In this moment, I draw strength from the writings of **Martin Luther**, who used the example of **Mary** and the words of the Magnificat (Luke 1:46-55) to urge the rulers of his time to exercise power in ways that serve all people.

Jesus gave us an image of a vine and its branches (John 15:1) to illustrate our connectedness to him and, through him, to one another. Our rootedness in Christ sustains us with his love. His love connects us to one another. We must stay connected to face the challenges of this moment.

An **end** to the government shutdown will not immediately resolve food insecurity, so we will keep feeding and supporting our neighbors. The racial profiling and harm to our immigrant neighbors show no signs of diminishing, so we will heed God's call to show up alongside these neighbors in solidarity. Our broken politics and partisan divisions will not heal by themselves, so we will show up through participation, bridge-building and advocacy.

No **matter** what happens next, we must continue to care for all neighbors, especially those who are marginalized. Our 1994 social message "Community Violence" tells us that "we have the responsibility to join with others to hold government accountable for protecting society and ensuring justice for all, and to seek changes in policies and practices toward these ends" (p. 4). As we do, I am confident that Christ's grace will be sufficient, freeing us to lift up others and seek justice for everyone.

I **invite** you to pray for and participate in ELCA ministries that support the well-being of all including [taking advocacy action](#), applying for [ELCA World Hunger Daily Bread Matching Grants](#) to support your hunger ministry, and watching the recent ELCA Advocacy webinar "[Faith Communities and the Realities of Food Assistance](#)."

Gracious god, we pray for our public servants, that they do their work in a spirit of wisdom, charity, and justice. Inspire them to use their authority to serve faithfully and to promote our common life. Guide our leaders to govern in such a way that all people enjoy a peaceful and just society. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen. —*All Creation Sings*, p. 50

21 "The time is coming when people will not put up with sound teaching, but, having their ears tickled, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths" (2 Timothy 4:3-4). Pray that the Spirit will give us insight and guidance when we struggle to distinguish God's truth from the falsehoods that lead us astray.

22 Ask God to strengthen and sustain those who work for peace between nations, including diplomats, negotiators, religious leaders and heads of state. Pray that they will find new ways to work through impasses, implement just and lasting peace agreements, and address the needs of those impacted by war and civil conflict.

23 Pray for congregations going through challenging times, that they will find resources and assistance to renew their sense of mission and their resolve to be God's loving presence in their communities.

24 Pray for Presiding Bishop Yehiel Curry, that his faith, his ministry experiences and the counsel of his siblings in Christ will inspire wisdom and equip him for guiding our church and its leaders to be persistent and creative in proclaiming God's restorative love.
