Redeemer to Welcome Interim Pastor March 15

Following action by the Congregation Council over the weekend, Redeemer will welcome **Pastor Elizabeth Hoster** as its interim pastor, effective **Sunday, March 15**.

An Episcopal priest, she is just wrapping up an interim assignment at Ascension and Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Wyoming, OH. Before that, she was the priest in charge at St. Luke's Church in Granville OH.

She was also an extended supply priest during the merger process for the now All Saints Lutheran and Episcopal Community in Washington Courthouse.

Pastor Elizabeth, who was recommended to Redeemer by the Southern Ohio Synod, met with the Congregation Council on Feb. 7 after which the council decided to offer her the position.

Pastor Elizabeth received her bachelor's degree in English literature with a minor in history from Ohio University in 1987 and her Master of Divinity degree in 2003 from the University of the South School of Theology.

She currently sits on the board of Healthy Congregations and is a hospice volunteer with Trinity Health/Mt. Carmel Health System.

Her interests include spiritual formation, social justice, music, reading, camping, travel, scuba diving, storytelling and fiber arts surface design.

But to get to know her better, folks are invited to a "getting to know" installment of the Adult Forum on **Sunday, March 15** where she will be interviewed and there will be an opportunity to ask questions.

Two Ash Wednesday Services Set for Feb. 18

Redeemer will hold two Ash Wednesday services this **Wednesday, Feb. 18**: one at 7 a.m. and the other at 7 p.m. Both will include the imposition of ashes and holy communion. The abbreviated 7 a.m. service will be in-person only while the 7 p.m. service will be both in-person and livestreamed.

Then from **Wednesday, Feb. 25** through **Wednesday, March 25**, Lenten Soup and Conversation will be held from noon to 1 p.m. in the Narthex. The sign-up sheet to provide soup, bread or a dessert is on the bulletin board next to the Library.

Midweek Lenten services run those same Wednesdays at 7 p.m.

Outreach Team Seeks Response to Signboard Survey

The Outreach Team oversees the signage around Redeemer since it's part of the public face the congregation presents to the community. The signboard on James Road has long been one of the ways the church communicates with passers-by, and many neighbors have commented on the messages over the years.

The current signboard has some limitations, and the Outreach Team has considered going digital several times in the past and is doing so once again. To help in their deliberations, they would like the congregation's input and thoughts. A survey is attached to this newsletter, and copies are also available in the Narthex.

Redeemer Holds Annual Meeting, Approves Spending Plan

Redeemer held its annual meeting **Sunday, Feb. 15** at which time the congregation approved the proposed spending plan for 2026, the Mission Endowment Fund distribution and revisions the Redeemer's constitution.

Finance Officer Laura Warren provided a brief overview of the 2026 budget, noting that it totals \$384,024 which is nearly \$100,000 less than last year's budget which included the repaving of the parking lot. In addition, the 2026 budget does not reflect the funds that will eventually be distributed to the benevolence beneficiaries because those are based on actual income and are distributed on a regular basis throughout the year. [Benevolence beneficiaries include the ELCA/Southern Ohio Synod, First English Lutheran Church, HopeWood Pines (formerly Lutheran Memorial Camp), Jacob's Porch, LSS Food Pantries and Lutheran Social Services.]

And while Redeemer ended the year with a \$11,105 deficit, Laura said that is not an issue for the church because Redeemer has a "strong balance sheet."

She added that Redeemer is "fortunate because it has no loans and has very generous people." And, in fact, the church was able to move \$22,000 to the Columbus Foundation for the building and equipment fund, taking that reserve fund to approximately \$50,000.

If folks have any questions, they should contact Laura.

Also, the congregation approved the distribution of \$7,450.85 which equals 4 percent of the interest from the Mission Endowment Fund. That distribution, based on suggestions from the congregation, recommendations by the Special Funds Team and approval by the Congregation Council, is as follows:

- First English Church Coffee Fund - \$250
- BREAD - \$1,000
- Holden Village - \$2,066.95



- Columbus Literacy Council - \$2,066.95
- Immigration Support - \$2,066.95

In other action, the congregation approved the changes to the constitution.

The meeting was followed by a light lunch from Subway and a dessert “potluck” in the Narthex.

Souper Bowl Results 2026 – Part 2

Kathleen Zwanziger reports that on Feb. 15, \$82 was added to last Sunday’s contributions, bringing the total to \$2,258.55 that will be contributed to the Food Pantry. The bowls will be out for one more week. “Can we surpass \$2,400?”

RLC to Serve Dinner at First English on March 12

On **Thursday, March 12**, Redeemer is scheduled to provide the dinner at First English. The menu will be: Sloppy Joe sandwiches, tater tots, corn, fresh fruit and cookies. There will be lemonade and water also available for the dinners. “We will need enough food for 125 dinners which will be served from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. Volunteers will need to be at First English by 4:30 p.m. to help,” says coordinator **Kay Ernsthausen**.

She added, “First English is serving as a warming center for the winter. If the temperature drops we will have more people than if it stays warm.

“The Sloppy Joes (made with two pounds of ground beef or turkey) need to arrive at First English hot. If you would like them picked up on Thursday, we have drivers who can help with this”. Just let Kay know you would like a pick up.

“The tater tots come frozen in a bag. They can be put in the freezer upstairs or downstairs. The most economical packages I found were the five-pound family fun bag. Both Giant Eagle, Kroger and Gordon Food Service carry the five-pound bags. The corn should be family-size bags. The fresh fruit we are looking for are cuties/Clementines or mandarin oranges – small citrus that is easy to peel – and bananas. We will break them down into small bunches. Remember for all the food, we are serving 125 dinners.”

A total of 240 or 20 dozen cookies are also needed.

“There is also a need for servers. Five to six servers will be good to have. For any questions contact Kay.

The sign up for food and helping can be found on the bulletin board next to the Library.

“Following is the recipe for Sloppy Joes – from **Kathy Mimlitch** – that has been used in the past.

“Thank you all for your commitment to this ministry.”

2 lb lean ground beef or ground turkey

1/2 cup chopped onion

1/2 cup chopped green pepper

1 tsp garlic powder

2 tsp prepared yellow mustard

1 1/2 cups ketchup

6 tsp brown sugar

Salt and pepper to taste

In a medium skillet over medium heat, brown the ground beef, onion and green pepper. Drain off liquids. Stir in garlic powder, mustard, ketchup and brown sugar. Mix thoroughly. Reduce heat and simmer for 30 minutes. Season with salt and pepper.

This makes ~ 12 servings.

Notes from Kathy: “I usually omit the green pepper (I don’t like it)! I sometimes use ketchup and barbecue sauce instead of just ketchup. I almost double the brown sugar as I like it sweet.”

Narthex Art Comes Down, Will Be on Break until Easter

In keeping with a “spare” theme during Lent, the Narthex art will be on break until Easter. That means those who loaned an item for the *Blue or Purple* exhibit are now being asked to take it home as the exhibit “rests and resets.”

Transportation Team Ministry Looking for Some Help!

Michelle Disbro writes, “Did you know that Redeemer provides transportation to people who might need a ride to a doctor’s appointment? Members can simply email NeedARide@redeemerluth.com and volunteers on this team respond if they’re able to help with that request.

“We’re looking for more members to be added to this helpful ministry. It really doesn’t require anything more than adding your name to the email group. Then, if a request to the Transportation Team comes into your email, respond if you’re available and willing to help. If you’re not available or able for that request, you simply do not

respond. No commitments – just a willingness to help out if you're able. If you're interested in be added to this transportation ministry team, please contact the church office to be added to the email group.

“On a more specific transportation request, **Grace and Ken Jones** are looking for someone to bring them to church for Sunday worship. [They live north of Broad and west of I-270.] We're hoping to put together some volunteers who might commit on a regular basis (for example, the first Sunday of the month). That person would be responsible to pick the Jones up and bring them to church OR take them home after church. We're going to put together a schedule based on the volunteers' preferences and availability (one way transportation or both, specific Sunday of the month, etc.)

“The Jones will be given the schedule and contact their driver if for some reason they need to cancel that ride for that Sunday. Please contact the church office if you're willing to sign up on a regular transportation schedule for the Jones.”

Noisy Offering to Go to LSS Choices

The Noisy Offering from now until Ash Wednesday will be collected for LSS Choices. The holidays can be a very stressful time. As a result, the number of people (both men and women) abused by their spouse increases.

Many stay with a spouse because it's the holidays. But once the beginning of the year comes around they find the courage to leave. Even though Choices is under the Lutheran Social Services (LSS) umbrella, they can use extra funds in the beginning of the year when their numbers go up.

Kay Ernsthansen writes, “The funds are so needed. Along with the increase is spousal abuse is the increase of human trafficking. Because of these two facts, we will be collecting noisy offering for LSS Choices.”

New Goals for New Year: *Reduce/Reuse*

In an effort to be kinder to the environment, folks at Redeemer want to provide an opportunity to do more reducing and reusing. To that end, coffee cup racks have been hung in the hallway by the drinking fountain to encourage members and friends to bring in their own coffee mug to hang on these racks.

Then, as **Michele Disbro** points out, “Whenever you want a cup of tea or coffee, *reduce* the amount of paper products used by *reusing* your coffee mug! Dirty mugs can be placed in the green dish tub on the table outside the kitchenette. Volunteers will wash the mugs and replace them on the coffee racks.

“We also have a row of mugs available for visitors. (Feel free to guide our visitors to these guest mugs.) There is space to hang more mug racks if we need more space for coffee mugs in the future.

“Continuing with the Reduce and Reuse goal: you are always encouraged to bring your own table service for potluck dinners at church. Paper products will always be available as well.”

Volunteers Sought to Provide Refreshments after Worship

Volunteers are needed to set up/provide refreshments following the Sunday worship service. A sign-up sheet can be found on the bulletin board next to the Library.

It doesn't need to be elaborate. Coffee, teas are in the cupboard and packaged cookies are under the counters.

22 Is there some realm of life right now where you feel as if you're in a wilderness and being tested? Ask **God** for strength, wisdom and guidance, and lean into the faith given to you by the Spirit.

23 Give thanks for ELCA Witness in Society, the advocacy ministry of our church that works to change public policy through our collective and individual voices, which are shaped and guided by biblical values of peacemaking, hospitality to strangers, care for creation, and concern for people living in poverty and struggling with hunger and disease.
