You Know Who Your Neighbors Are, and You Say Yes

Last Wednesday morning, the church phone was ringing nonstop. Four of you were working in the conference room. I was grateful for the work you were doing AND for the fact that you were witnessing the phone madness: otherwise, had I tried to describe it, no-one would have believed me.

The word was out: Redeemer was helping folks. Compass and Salvation Army had run out of rental assistance funds for the month and were suggesting that folks call small and mighty Redeemer. Because of the Good Samaritan fund that you have so generously supported, 18 families avoided eviction for now, utilities were turned back on, and some folks could eat decently at the end of the month.

I go by the standards that were set by previous pastors: Anonymity is dignity—those being helped are not listed anywhere public—and we write checks directly to landlords or utility companies. We help out folks in a few very close zip codes with a limit of approximately \$300 per person per year for rent or utilities. We also have Kroger cards, which can be used for gas or groceries. In the past few weeks, we had to hit pause twice because the fund was running low, and both times you heard about it and responded. Please know how grateful I am, and how deeply grateful our neighbors are.

The world is in a state of chaotic need right now. So many need-based programs have been stripped of funding for ghastly reasons—the cost of just one tomahawk missile could feed 112 families for a year. We may think the situation is hopeless. But you are giving generously, we are helping locally, and it matters. You make hope real for our neighbors.

The Good Samaritan fund is just one of your many efforts to be real followers of Jesus. By having basketball courts and basketball camp, you encourage play and recreation and community among young people in our neighborhood. By gathering with BREAD for the Nehemiah action and other events, you change the city for good. By speaking up in city council, you make justice real for folks who need it most. And yes, as I said before, even the simple acts of having a water fountain and a port-a-loo outside are absolutely essential ministries.

Thank you for being who you say you are!

There will be lemonade and water also available for the diners. We will need enough food for 100 dinners. Dinner will be served from 5:30 to 6:30. We will need to be at First English at 4:30.

“We need people to make Sloppy Joes. (2 lbs. of ground meat into Sloppy Joes – recipe available on the bulletin board next to the Library or from the church office.) The Sloppy Joes need to arrive at First English hot. If you are making Sloppy Joes and would like them picked up on Thursday, we have drivers who can help with this. Just let Kay know you would like a pick up. The tater tots come in a 5 lb. family frozen bag. They can be put in the freezer upstairs or downstairs. The corn should be frozen family size bags. The fresh fruit we are looking for are the cuties size oranges and bananas. Dessert will be cake and is being provided.

“There is also a need for servers. five-six servers will be good to have. For any questions contact Kay. Sign up is on the bulletin board in the hallway.

Non Police Crisis Response Is Issue 5 on May 5 Ballot

Now, for early voters, through the May 5 Election Day, Columbus voters have the chance to support Issue 5, a community-driven crisis response amendment that reflects their call to seek justice, love mercy, and care for our neighbors in moments of vulnerability. The proposal creates a compassionate, non-police response for behavioral health and other non-violent crises – offering trained clinicians, social workers, and peer supporters who can bring calm, safety, and dignity to those who need help.

BREAD encourages the congregation to learn about Issue 5, talk with loved ones, and plan to vote in the May primary “so that every neighbor can feel safe reaching out for care.”

City Council Passes Rental Registry

Redeemer's BREAD reports that on April 20, the Columbus City Council voted to establish a Rental Registry – an important step toward protecting renters across the city – with only one council member dissenting. BREAD leaders once again filled the City Hall chambers, continuing the faithful, persistent presence that helped move this legislation forward. Last May, more than 1,300 BREAD members attended the Nehemiah Action, where **Council Member Nick Bankston** committed to work with BREAD to draft this policy. His leadership was recognized again during the vote.

“The hearing also featured powerful testimony from people of faith. **Julianne Johnson** shared the story of a Haitian immigrant family she has been accompanying – parents of a six-year-old and a newborn – who have faced

unsafe conditions, surprise fees, and an eviction notice based on a late fee that they did not know about. She described how language barriers and fear keep many immigrant families from advocating for themselves, and how the Rental Registry gives them a tool they desperately need. Council members thanked her for bringing these realities to light and affirmed that the new registry is designed precisely to protect families who are most vulnerable to exploitation.

Pastor Elizabeth recently offered a similar reminder when she spoke about RLC's Good Samaritan Fund and the importance of ensuring that rental-assistance checks reach the families they are intended to help. Her example underscored the same truth at the heart of the Rental Registry: when systems are clearer and more accountable, vulnerable neighbors are less likely to be taken advantage of – and the shared ministry of compassion becomes more effective.

“This is a meaningful victory for justice in Columbus and a reminder of what happens when people of faith show up, speak out, and stand with their neighbors.”

Transportation Assistance Needed through August

Al Rider writes, “We need to find drivers to help get **WilFrantz Raymond** from his apartment (currently on corner of James and Livingston) to twice-weekly English classes at Columbus City Schools Adult Education Center (2323 Lexington Ave.) He has no car (*still can't read English, which is the problem we're trying to solve here...*), and he gets home too late from work to be able to take a city bus. Drivers are needed.

“The class meets from 6 to 8 p.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays through **Aug. 12**. It's a 20-minute drive on back streets (*I'll provide a map...*) and a 30-35 minute drive if you follow GPS and take our traffic-clogged freeways. **Don't!!!** (*I have taught WilFrantz the ironic English phrase 'Rush Hour,' when no one is rushing anywhere; and we both laugh at it...*)

“I will mostly do Mondays myself. We are looking for help on Wednesday evenings. But if someone is willing to drive him on Mondays, I will gladly switch to Wednesday for those weeks. It requires picking him up at ~5:30 p.m. just after he gets home from work, and driving him home again from 8-8:20 p.m. afterward. The nursing classroom is a nice, comfortable place to wait for him, where they have chairs and tables and access to electric outlets if you want to use your laptop while waiting. And a nice friendly skeleton hanging next to the chalkboard with a toothy grin!

“I currently have the slots filled through **Wednesday May 13**, so we are in need of drivers from **Wednesday May 20** through **Wednesday Aug. 12**. That's 11 Wednesdays. And if anyone is willing to cover for me on a Monday, I will do the Wednesday that week. I'm keeping the schedule coordinated for him.

“Learning English is the key to helping this refugee family find work and housing and making a home here. Our amateur vocabulary coaching enabled WilFrantz to skip ‘Beginners Level’ and start in advanced ‘Level 1.’ Once he finishes that in August, ‘Level 2’ begins and he can do that class through ‘Level 4’ from home using ZOOM. We just need 11 weeks' help to get the ball rolling. **Michelina** might need to take the class later after the baby is no longer nursing, so she can also get a job. But that's another issue. For now, thanks for your help.”

Adult Forum to Continue Exploring ‘Migration/Faith’

Under the leadership of Redeemer member **Pastor Al Rider** the Sunday Adult Forum will continue to explore the topic of “Migration and Faith” on **Sunday, May 10** following worship from about 11:15 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in Room 2.

He writes, “Genealogy is one of my passions: ... I've researched my own family tree back to the Middle Ages; and now I coach people in how to do their own genealogy research and writing. I've learned that my family and

Karen's were all migrants, and Karen and I lived abroad ourselves as migrants. As a preacher, I've also noticed that people in Bible days were crossing international and cultural borders a lot.

"Might there be something to learn there?"

"I've been amazed to discover how much of the Bible is built around migration. ... Nearly all of it, cover to cover. **Abraham** and **Sarah**, the Patriarchs, Israel in Egypt, the Exodus, the Judges in the Holy Land, Ruth, Babylon, the Prophets, **Jesus'** family in Egypt, Pentecost ... Basically, the whole story.

"And I've also been amazed to see what happens to people as they migrate and cross cultures. They learn, they grow, their faith is stretched. They become conscious of cultural riches in others who are different from them. They become more faith-full and aware of the sacred in everything they do.

"It will include:

- "Some reflection on your own ancestors who were migrants (both those who chose to move, and those who were forced to move.

- "Some Bible overview.

- "A look at what we are learning these days as a migrant-facing congregation.

- "Lots of conversation and reflection, as usual.

Noisy Offering to Go to Columbus Diaper Bank

Contributions through Redeemer's Noisy Offering will now be going to the Columbus Diaper Bank. **Kay Ernsthansen** reports, "The Columbus Diaper Bank does not distribute diapers directly to individuals. Diapers are distributed through a network of service organizations. By working with organizations that are established in the community it allows the Columbus Diaper Bank to contribute a resource to our partners, increasing their services to the community. It also allows us to be efficient and to utilize the organization's expertise to distribute to families and babies in need."

Partners include Columbus Public Health, Celebrate One, Little Bottoms Free Store, Homeless Families Foundation, Huckleberry House, Lower Lights Christian Health Center, Lutheran Social Services Choices for Victims of Domestic Violence, Food Pantries: Broad Street Food Pantry, NNEMAP Food Pantry, Vineyard Columbus Northside Food Pantry, Worthington Resource Pantry, Bishop Griffin Center, GRIN Food Pantry, Baptist For Life of Central Ohio and Gladden Food Pantry,

The diaper bank highlights the following "diaper realities":

- A baby needs eight-10 diapers a day. That's about 3,650 diapers a year.

- Diapers cost between \$100-\$150 a month.

- Most laundromats and day care centers do not except cloth diapers.

Kay notes that several of the organizations listed Redeemer has supported either thru volunteer hours or other designated "Noisy Offerings."

"This is just another organization we can support – that turns around and helps the community."
