It Is Hard to Know, Good to Be Prepared

It is hard to predict what the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and ICE will do and when in the wake of the U.S. Supreme Court's decision Thursday, June 25 to revoke the Temporary Protective Status (TPS) that enabled Haitians to remain in the U.S. because of poor conditions in their home country. **Keep whistles at hand to alert others of enforcement activities.**

Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine, has long supported the state's Haitian population in Springfield and other cities, in the past calling the potential revocation of TPS "a mistake."

"Today's decision is a legal decision. As I have stated in the past, the policy to remove these individuals from this country is a mistake," said DeWine on Thursday in a release following the ruling's announcement.

"As a result of today's ruling, the over 10,000 Haitians who have been living in Ohio (mostly in the Springfield area) legally through TPS will now be here illegally and will be subject to immediate deportation. This also means that while these Haitians were working and contributing to our community and economy yesterday, today it is now illegal to employ them."

DeWine said the current situation in Haiti "could hardly be much worse."

It is, however, important to know your rights. The following is a reprint of information distributed at Redeemer earlier this year:

YOUR CORE RIGHTS

Apply in most places in the U.S.: rules differ at borders and checkpoints. Most constitutional rights apply to everyone, regardless of immigration status. (Some rules change at the border.)

- Right to remain silent. Say: "I am exercising my right to remain silent."
- Right to refuse consent to many searches. Say: "I do not consent to a search." (Police may still search if a legal exception applies.)
- Right to a lawyer/Criminal cases: ask for a lawyer and stay silent. Immigration cases: you may hire a lawyer, but the government usually does not provide one for free.
- Do not lie or present false documents. Do not sign papers you do not understand. Ask for a lawyer if unsure.

INSIDE THE U.S. (AWAY FROM BORDERS)

ON THE STREET: Officers may ask questions. Ask clearly: "Am I being detained or am I free to go?" If free to go, you may leave calmly.

If lawfully detained: You may have to provide limited information. (Name-only laws vary by state.)

IF YOU ARE DRIVING: When lawfully stopped, drivers usually must show a driver's license, often registration and insurance. (Rules vary by state.)

ICE AND YOUR HOME: ICE Forms I-200/I-205 are administrative (not signed by a judge). Administrative ICE warrants do NOT allow entry into your home. ICE

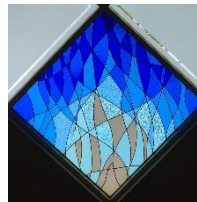
East window, from Genesis Chap. 1:

“On the third day, God gathered the waters to reveal the land and then commanded the land to bring forth sprouts, seed-bearing plants, and fruit trees.”



North window, from John Chap. 1:

“The true light that enlightens every person was coming into the world. The light shines in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it.”



South window, from Acts Chap. 2:

“On the day of Pentecost, there appeared tongues as of fire, distributed and resting on each one of them.”



Noisy Offering to Go to Habitat for Humanity of Ohio

Redeemer’s Noisy Offering – the offering of loose change – will now be going to Habitat for Humanity of Ohio, a statewide 501(c)(3) organization whose main purpose is to increase the capacity of Ohio’s 46 Habitat for Humanity affiliates to build simple, decent homes in partnership with families in need of affordable housing. Located in Columbus, Habitat for Humanity of Ohio provides resource development, advocacy and training to its affiliates.

According to the organization, its ministry is based on the conviction that to follow the teachings of Jesus, “we must love and care for one another. Our love must not be words only – it must be true love which shows itself in action.

“Habitat provides an opportunity for people to put their faith and love into action. We bring diverse groups of people together make affordable housing and better communities are reality for everyone.”

“Habitat for Humanity has an open-door policy: All who believe that everyone needs a decent, affordable place to live are welcome to help with the work, regardless of race, religion, age, gender, political views or any of the other distinctions that too often divide people. In short, Habitat welcomes volunteers and supporters from all backgrounds and also serves people in need of decent housing regardless of race or religion. As a matter of policy,

Habitat for Humanity International and its affiliated organizations do not proselytize. This means that Habitat will not offer assistance on the expressed or implied condition that people must either adhere to or convert to a particular faith, or listen and respond to messaging designed to induce conversion to a particular faith.”

RLC Policy on Payments to Individuals

The Redeemer Congregation Council has adopted a policy of not disbursing funds directly to individuals with the exception of funds requested by individuals for reimbursement of church related expenses and funds requested in payment for personal services. may enter only if they have a judicial warrant (signed by a judge/magistrate), or someone with authority consents or there is an emergency (exigent circumstances). You may say through the door: “I do not consent to entry. Please slide the warrant under the door.”

THE ‘100-MILE ZONE’

Being within 100 miles of the border does not deprive one of constitutional rights. Federal rules define this as 100 air miles from the border. At fixed checkpoints: brief immigration questions may be allowed. Searches still require consent or legal cause.

BORDERS AND PORTS OF ENTRY

(International airports, land borders, seaports). Border agents have broader authority during inspection. You may be required to answer basic identity and admissibility questions. Non-citizens: Refusing to answer required questions may result in denial of entry. U.S. citizens: Cannot be denied entry but may be delayed for inspection. You may say: “I’m not comfortable answering that question.” “I want to speak to a lawyer.” (At the border, questioning may continue. Consequences are greater for non-citizens.) Electronic devices: CBP may search device under agency policy. Refusing to unlock may cause delays or other consequences, especially for non-citizens.

STAY CALM AND SAFE

Do not run, resist or interfere. Keep hands visible. You can often record police in public, provided you do not interfere. (Rules vary by location.)

BOTTOM LINE

Officers may ask questions. Whether you must answer depends on where you are and whether you are detained. Silence + “Am I free to go?” + No consent to searches (when applicable) helps protect your rights.
