May We ...

For the past few weeks we have been wrestling with the parables of Jesus as told in the Gospel according to Matthew. Some are easy, some are hard, some may feel downright obscure. But all of them invite us to think about how we view life here and now and how God hopes for it to be.

Jesus uses all kinds of ordinary stuff, from weeds and invasive species to treasure-seeking trespassers, to show that an abundance of grace and love and healing can come from the most messy and mundane circumstances. He uses a variety of stories so that each of us can find ourselves in The Story of redemption. But there is a next part to the story: Once we recognize ourselves, what will we do with the information?

For a reflection on this, I recommend the music of **Carrie Newcomer**, particularly the song "May We be Released." It is available on Spotify, Apple Music, and other platforms (not Pandora). The words are below.

Parables can be the wisdom that I didn't want to hear. But we can be released into new growth and understanding.

What songs do you find helpful with growth, grace, and challenge? Shall we share and make a community playlist?

A Note from Ashley Bird, Council President

On Sunday morning, July 19, I announced to the congregation that the Congregational Council has selected **Pastor Kayla Hopgood** as our candidate for pastor of Redeemer. The unanimous vote came at a special council meeting last Thursday, July 16. This followed a unanimous decision from the Call Committee that we consider her for the full-time position here at Redeemer.

Pastor Kayla was ordained on Sept. 9, 2023 to the ministry of Word and Sacrament and has been serving Ascension Lutheran Church in Newtown, PA on a part-time basis since that time. Prior to discerning a call to ministry, she worked as a fundraiser for nonprofits focused on educational equity. She completed her Masters of Divinity at Princeton Theological Seminary and is trained as a spiritual director through Oasis Ministries for Spiritual Development.

Pastor Kayla lives in Ewing, NJ with her husband, the **Rev. Dr. Miles Hopgood** and their two young children.

The Call Committee, which interviewed Pastor Kayla both on Zoom and in-person session, described her as intelligent, gracious, passionate for justice, open, collaborative, and spiritually grounded.

Krista Skipper, chair of the Call Committee, described Pastor Kayla as joyful, warm, and connected to conversations. Krista said she never had an awkward moment during the whole day with Pastor Kayla.

Additional impressions included her being well prepared and asking probing questions. She was raised in the Church of the Nazarene but sampled many denominations while in college. She met her future husband who was a member of the ELCA and was comfortable immediately with Lutheranism and the ELCA. She feels very strongly about choosing the Lutheran Church after trying many other churches.

Krista reported that Pastor Kayla has done some spiritual training, and you can feel that when interacting with her. She is ready for a full-time position after working a part-time call and feels she can balance family and work. She is married to **the Rev. Dr. Miles Hopgood** and they have with two young children. They are moving to Bexley from Ewing, NJ because her husband will become a full-time professor at Trinity Lutheran Seminary.

Following council's interview with her, some of their comments included wise beyond years, fresh ideas, emphasis on listening, building community, seems mature even though young. There was no hesitation supporting her as primary candidate.

So what is next?

Council is in the process of setting up dates both for the congregation to meet Pastor Kayla and for a special congregational meeting to vote on her call. [See separate story, this issue of *Reflections*.] Because of their move, those dates will probably happen later in August with an anticipated start date of Oct. 1, should the congregation agree to her call.

She writes, "About 20 years ago, **Donna Schmidt** (may she rest in peace), who worked at the Augsburg Fortress Bookstore at Trinity Lutheran Seminary, gave me the book *Raise the Banners High*, by **P.T. Hardiman** and **J. Niemann**, and set me on a path of creating processional banners for Redeemer.

"We haven't carried them in procession in 10 years, but maybe we will start again with a new pastor.

"From the left: I made **Redeemer Tree** for our 60th anniversary in 2017. There are 60 pieces of colorful 'fruit' in the tree, one for each year. **Donna Voelkel** helped me work out the design.

"I adapted **Festive Cross** from the *Banners* book. Debuting on Easter, it's one of the first three I made.

Tree of Life is a traditional quilt block which was also suggested in the *Banners* book. Along with Festive Cross, it debuted on Easter. (The last of the first three had been **Carolina Lily**, which was up in June and July.)"



Noisy Offering to Go to Habitat for Humanity of Ohio

Redeemer's Noisy Offering – the offering of loose change – will now be going to Habitat for Humanity of Ohio, a statewide 501(c)(3) organization whose main purpose is to increase the capacity of Ohio's 46 Habitat for Humanity affiliates to build simple, decent homes in partnership with families in need of affordable housing. Located in Columbus, Habitat for Humanity of Ohio provides resource development, advocacy and training to its affiliates.

According to the organization, its ministry is based on the conviction that to follow the teachings of Jesus, "we must love and care for one another. Our love must not be words only – it must be true love which shows itself in action.

"Habitat provides an opportunity for people to put their faith and love into action. We bring diverse groups of people together make affordable housing and better communities are reality for everyone."

"Habitat for Humanity has an open-door policy: All who believe that everyone needs a decent, affordable place to live are welcome to help with the work, regardless of race, religion, age, gender, political views or any of the other distinctions that too often divide people. In short, Habitat welcomes volunteers and supporters from all backgrounds and also serves people in need of decent housing regardless of race or religion. As a matter of policy, Habitat for Humanity International and its affiliated organizations do not proselytize. This means that Habitat will not offer assistance on the expressed or implied condition that people must either adhere to or convert to a particular faith, or listen and respond to messaging designed to induce conversion to a particular faith."

Pastor Elizabeth to Be Gone; Pastors Copeland, Caesar to Preach

Pastor Elizabeth will be gone from **Thursday, July 30** through **Friday, Aug. 7**. During that time, **Pastor Brad Binau** will be on call for pastoral emergencies. **Rev. Dr. Adam Copeland** will preach on **Sunday, Aug. 3**.

Copeland spent 15 years in ministry, higher education leadership, and health care strategy – teaching at Concordia College and Luther Seminary before serving most recently as senior director of digital strategy at Mayo Clinic.

He is now exploring new opportunities to serve in Columbus and will be teaching at OSU's John Glenn College of Public Affairs in the fall. He is ordained in the Presbyterian Church USA and has served in several ELCA-related ministries, including the Board of Trustees for Portico Benefit Services.

His degrees are from St. Olaf College (B.A.), Columbia Theological Seminary (M.Div.), and North Dakota State University (Ph.D.). “Adam is delighted to be putting down roots in this community, where he and his family have made Bexley their home. He attends Broad Street Presbyterian Church.”

Then on **Sunday, Aug. 9**, **Pastor Theodore “Teddy” Caesar**, Pentecostal pastor at Destiny Church International and teacher at Whitehall City Schools, returns to preach.

Pastor Teddy earned his Bachelor of Arts in psychology at the University of Cincinnati and Master of Divinity at Trinity Lutheran Seminary at Capital University.

He fills diverse roles within education and athletics, coaching high school football and serving as a social studies teacher. He further serves on the Board of Directors for CelebrateOne, a city of Columbus initiative to combat infant mortality. In 2012, Pastor Teddy relaunched the Destiny Church International in Columbus, Ohio -- an outgrowth of the ministry founded by his late mother in 2004. Under his leadership, the church remains a beacon of hope and transformation.

Since 2014, he has been happily married to **Attorney Kathleen Ceasar**. Together, they are the proud parents of their daughter, **Atarah**, who remains a great source of joy.
